### Service Learning and the Meaning of Student Success

"The core mission of the community college is to provide education for individuals in its service region, and to serve its community as a community-based institution of higher education."

-California Legislature Assembly Resolution, April 8th 2014

The Service-Learning and Public Service Program at Evergreen works on a large scale, coordinating community service efforts for college students. During its height, more than 200 students attended the program per semester for the volunteer hours, college credits, and invaluable experiences it provided.

Evergreen Valley College provides SLPSP as a way to give back to the community, while fulfilling the district's goals of student success. Students put to use the information they have studied in class and learn the value of community service. There are opportunities available on campus as tutors and as assistant professors and, outside of the college, 60 community organizations offered positions in various fields of study.

It was in the 2010-2011 academic year when the college's services got hit hard by budget cuts. Service-Learning in particular lost its Program Assistant position and was shut down. When the program reopened, almost everyone involved had moved on, leaving few of its original participants. Everything had to be rebuilt, with only 26 remaining community partners, 40 registered students, and 5 faculty members to coordinate the effort.

But as you may have heard, the SLPSP is currently in a crisis again, pending a decision by the administration in the 2014 fall semester. In a statement by the President of Evergreen Valley College, he explained "it was brought to [our] attention that the Service Learning program, with its current level of faculty support, is operated in an 'unsafe manner' and that this required an immediate response.

Their concern is that the program doesn't have enough supervisors for all the students working



outside of campus, making it possible for some service projects to be conducted unsafely. The district chancellor made the issue known, however no specific incident has been cited. If the program is found to have significant safety hazards, it will be closed until necessary changes have been made.

Looking back at 2010 and how the progress of the program got set back by years, it is clear what is at stake in this decision. Should the program be allowed to operate with its limited resources, or should it risk everything in another closure? To get a better sense of the program's needs, I went to Program Coordinator Marjorie Clark for her stance on the issue.

Marjorie explained that "accurate databases and faculty reports were major weaknesses" of the Service-Learning and Public Services Program, but that it was no fault of the staff. Even with the help of two separate resolutions by the EVC Academic Senate in 2011 and this past April recommending an increase in its funding, the program has had too few personnel to complete all of its duties.

It is Marjorie's belief, as well as the Academic Senate's, that after another disruption of services the community may lose its remaining faith in the program. In short, the problems discovered by the chancellor would have to be resolved in a non-invasive way because in her words "the program would never survive another closing".

"Some people hear their inner voices with great clearness. And they live by what they hear. Such people become crazy...or they become legend." – Jim Harrison. In this world we have those who are born into comfort and those who have to work for it: Hermes Castro is a man who is half human half machine.

Growing up, Hermes was born into an immigrant family that had to risk their wellbeing in order to have a brighter future. At the age of ten, he and his family

crossed the Mexican border in search of work and dreams to be pursued. Once they actually made it here to the United States, his father spent most of his time working to be able to put food in the mouths of his family. Despite working long hours Hermes' father still managed to condition himself by running marathons and always brought his children with him so they'd be able to realize what hard work feels like.

Since Hermes was constantly pushed past his limits, he grew a fascination with jogging and biking, he'd usually jog to school and joined his school's basketball and track teams. As Hermes quotes, "I was beating people up on track". He broke his school's mile record at an astonishing time of four minutes and thirty-eight seconds, he was pushing his own limits and the limits of those around him. As time passed, his athletic ability grew stronger; his constant repetition of working out molded him into the warrior he became as an adult. He had his life flowing towards a good direction; he was working a good job from which he rode his bike back and forth every day.

One day during his daily routine of bicycling to work, Hermes' life would change permanently. As he

rode his bike down the street, a drunk driver going forty-five miles per hour collided with Hermes causing intensive pain and drastic body changes. He suffered from a stroke and broke both his fibula and tibia from both legs. As he was in the hospital, thoughts of giving up on his dreams rushed inside his mind. Due to the accident Hermes lost control of his legs and had to be put on a wheelchair, diminishing his dreams of running multiple marathons and keeping focused on playing basketball.

Once he started to recover Hermes was too stubborn and dedicated to give up on himself and call it quits: he used a stationary bicycle for up to three hours a

day and walked a mile daily. He managed to still play basketball fiercely even though he was a paraplegic; his skills were noticed by the Mexican national paraplegic basketball team and they granted him a chance to redeem his goals. Playing with the Mexican basketball team gave him the opportunity to play against the world champion Canadian team. As Hermes and his team smoothly took down the Canadian team in

Colombia they were blessed with another opportunity of playing against Korea's national team.

Hermes still motivates himself to be part of marathons despite having to use a walker; he was part of the Rock n Roll marathon in San Diego in 2011 and inspired many other upcoming athletes. In the future he hopes to walk from San Jose all the way down to San Diego to bring awareness to the world about paraplegic research. Hermes has been broken down both physically and mentally but never loses sight of where he wants to be in life, never loses hope of what he could be and most importantly never gives up on himself. And that's why I say, Hermes is half human half machine.

Because they're our sisters, said Malala. Because they're innocent girls targeted by terrorists, said Hillary. #BringBackOurGirls

On April 14th, in Nigeria, a group of men raided a girls boarding school (Chibok) telling the girls that they would take them to safety. After the girls realized that the men were actually terrorists who had previously perpetrated mass killings, 53 managed to escape over the next few days but 276 girls remained in captivity. And by the beginning of May, the terrorist group, the Boko Haram, had threatened to sell the girls into marriage (forced prostitution in a sense).

Though #BringOurGirlsBack had become viral with over 1.5 million people calling for their release, it was already rumored that the girls had been sold. The Boko Haram also continued to strike and kidnapped more girls each time. They revealed that they would give back the girls only if the government released certain terrorist prisoners.

In response, the Nigerian government only offered a monetary reward for information on the Boko Haram and where the girls were. As governments procrastinated and discussed a plan of action, troops of soldiers and people rallied and began to search for the missing girls.

Now, however, many are feared to be lost forever, separated, and already pregnant.


So why did the governments not bring the girls back? Firstly, the US urged the Nigerian government to not deal with terrorists ever even if it could save hundreds of Nigerian girls (a rule that the US then broke when they traded terrorists for one American soldier, Bergdahl). Secondly, women's rights and child prostitution are simply issues everywhere. For example, 800,000 American children are reported missing and over 100,000 children are used in US sex rings each year. In an undeveloped country with Al-Qaeda-related terrorists who do not believe in women's rights, the Boko Haram kidnappings are somewhat expected to occur.

So how can we solve this? Even though several organizations continually try different methods to liberate women, women still face not only violence but other problems such as gender wage gap, property ownership regulations, bans from participation in jobs and education, infanticide, and marriage/divorce problems in countries around the world. Not only does the Nigerian government need to create anti-sexism laws but the people need to bring these issues into the spotlight. #BringBackOurGirls should not just be another hashtag lost in a slew of other social media campaigns. It is up to us, the international community, to intervene.

Because every EVC female student will face some form of gender inequality at some point in her life. And because it's time that the whole world realized that its female half is an equal half, #YesAllWomen
